<u>Readings this week:</u> Jer 20:7 - 9; Ps 62; Rom 12:1 – 2; Mt 16:21 - 27.

Gospel Reflection ~ Greg Sunter: This week's gospel is the first of three predictions of Jesus' death and resurrection in Matthew's gospel (see also Mark and Luke). Despite Peter's confession of faith that immediately precedes this passage (see last week's gospel), the disciples still do not have a very solid understanding of Jesus' purpose. They may regard him as the Messiah, but still do not fully understand what that means. In this passage, Jesus is beginning to prepare them for the events of the passion – his death and resurrection. He is trying to lead them to a greater understanding of his mission and message. But Peter abruptly 'rebukes' Jesus and tells him not to speak like that. One can almost hear Peter saying, 'Look, Jesus, you've got a good thing going here, don't spoil it by talking about dying!' However, Jesus responds to Peter very sharply, suggesting that his lack of understanding is inspired by evil and reflects human thought, not divine wisdom. The passage then leads in to a description of the challenge of discipleship. To be a follower of Jesus means to 'deny' oneself, take up one's cross and follow Jesus. In the context of this passage, to 'deny' oneself means to not be concerned about 'I' but to be concerned about 'You' – to put others before self. To be a follower of Jesus means to be selfless, not self-centred. In the ultimate example of this, Jesus tells his disciples that whoever wishes to save their life will lose it, but whoever loses their life for Jesus' sake will find it. To 'save' your life is to hold back from giving yourself fully to the message of Jesus – to be 'half-hearted' in your faith. But to 'lose' yourself in the message of Jesus is to fully give yourself over to living the reign of God and through 'losing' yourself in this way, Jesus tells us, is how to truly find life. Historical Context: Whoever loses his life for my sake... At the time of the writing of Matthew's gospel (around 75-80 CE), Christians were being persecuted and put to death for their beliefs. They were literally giving up their lives for their faith. These persecuted Christians saw Jesus' triumph over death as a sign of great hope and trust in the future for themselves. Jesus' words in the gospel - 'whoever loses his life for my sake will find it' would give hope to those under persecution that ultimately they too would triumph and that the deaths of their friends were not in vain. Scriptural context: Not quite there... This passage immediately follows the passage of last week's gospel which featured Peter's confession of faith – his inspired revelation that 'You are the Messiah, the Son of the Living God.' The reader might think, 'Aha, the disciples have finally got it!' But in a very clever piece of writing, the author of Matthew's gospel follows this revelation of faith immediately with an example of the lack of clarity that the disciples, including Peter, still possess. This happens throughout the gospels. Whenever the disciples have a bit of an insight, they are almost immediately shown to only have a partial understanding of the truth. The full revelation of Jesus' mission and ministry is not easy to grasp and even the disciples were not quite there until they had seen the 'full story' played out before and within them. Living the Gospel: Have you got what it takes? For some people, to be a Christian is a 'soft option' - they see being Christian as being a bit 'fluffy'. This week's gospel is a reminder of the real challenge of being a Christian. Jesus reminds us that to be one of his followers we must be prepared to pick up our cross – whatever our particular cross might be – and still follow his example. To be a Christian means that we don't fall in a heap when difficulty comes our way; we take up the burden – our cross – and continue to look forward with hope. To live like Jesus is no easy option.







Readings and Commentaries

What is widely known as "The Prayer of St Francis," either as vocal prayer or in one of its sung settings, first came to light on the eve of World War I. No longer credited to the saint himself, it still encapsulates key themes from today's word of God:

Lord, make me an instrument of your peace.

Where there is hatred, let me bring love. Where there is offence, let me bring pardon.

Where there is discord, let me bring union. Where there is error, let me bring truth.

Where there is doubt, let me bring faith. Where there is despair, let me bring hope.

Where there is darkness, let me bring your light. Where there is sadness, let me bring joy.

O Master, let me not seek as much to be consoled as to console, to be understood as to understand, to be loved as to love,

for it is in giving that one receives, it is in self-forgetting that one finds,

it is in pardoning that one is pardoned,

it is in dying that one is raised to eternal life.

A reading from the book of Jeremiah

You have seduced me, Lord, and I have let myself be seduced; you have overpowered me: you were the stronger. I am a daily laughing-stock, everybody's butt.

Each time I speak the word, I have to howl and proclaim: 'Violence and ruin!'
The word of the Lord has meant for me insult, derision, all day long.

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 62:2-6, 8-9

R. My soul is thirsting for you, O Lord my God.

O God, you are my God, for you I long; for you my soul is thirsting. My body pines for you like a dry, weary land without water. R.

So I gaze on you in the sanctuary to see your strength and your glory. For your love is better than life, my lips will speak your praise. R.

So I will bless you all my life, in your name I will lift up my hands. My soul shall be filled as with a banquet, my mouth shall praise you with joy. R.

For you have been my help; in the shadow of your wings I rejoice. My soul clings to you; your right hand holds me fast. R.

First Reading

20:7-9

Chapters 11 to 20 of the book of the prophet Jeremiah contain several intense passages, often called the "laments," "confessions" or "complaints" of the prophet. Today's reading is the first part of the last of these powerful passages. Jeremiah feels trapped between the unrelenting demands God has made of him and the active opposition he has had to face from the people. No wonder he cries out against God in pain, anger and anguish.

The language he uses in this lament is shockingly violent. He accuses God of forcing him to undertake his prophetic mission, using terms related to sexual assault. God has seduced and overpowered him. To make matters worse his preaching only provokes "insult, derision, all day long". In spite of all that, he cannot escape the "fire burning in my heart".

The lectionary spares us the rest of Jeremiah's diatribe. It culminates in the desperate curse he utters at ever having been born. The rationale for choosing this disturbing text becomes clear when we hear Jesus foreshadowing his own rejection, suffering and death in the gospel. But we hear nothing from Jesus like Jeremiah's fierce complaint, only his plea in the Garden of Olives to be spared the cup he must drink.

There is no more impassioned text than this in the whole of the scriptures. Readers may be tempted to temper its ferocity. Without going to the other extreme and overdramatising it, they need to be faithful to the depth and power of Jeremiah's feelings, even if they know some of the assembly may be scandalised. The reading should not be rushed. Everyone should be given the time they need to absorb what they are hearing.

Responsorial Psalm

While Psalm 62/63 may be categorised as a lament, the grounds for this aren't obvious in the verses chosen for the responsorial psalm. They convey a spirit of heartfelt longing for God. The psalmist appears peaceful, trusting and grateful. There is just the slightest hint in the first line of the final stanza that there has been trouble: "For you have been my help". This psalm may thus seem a strange choice to follow on from the turbulence of Jeremiah's anguish in the first reading. Ironically, the connection is greatest in a later verse that we do not hear. The psalmist looks ahead to the destruction of his enemies who will be put to the sword, become the prey of jackals and go down to the depths of the earth.

As it stands, the psalm invites us to imagine that for all his complaint Jeremiah, like the psalmist, was positively captivated by God. It's mean to awaken in us a longing for God akin to a desert thirsting for water. It encourages us with the promise of a banquet and the assurance of God's saving help. Readers who make the psalmist's yearning for God their own will confer a blessing on the community.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

12:1-2

Think of God's mercy, my brothers, and worship him, I beg you, in a way that is worthy of thinking beings, by offering your living bodies as a holy sacrifice, truly pleasing to God. Do not model yourselves on the behaviour of the world around you, but let your behaviour change, modelled by your new mind. This is the only way to discover the will of God and know what is good, what it is that God wants, what is the perfect thing to do.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

16:21-27

Jesus began to make it clear to his disciples that he was destined to go to Jerusalem and suffer grievously at the hands of the elders and chief priests and scribes, to be put to death and to be raised up on the third day. Then, taking him aside, Peter started to remonstrate with him. 'Heaven preserve you, Lord,' he said. 'This must not happen to you.' But he turned and said to Peter, 'Get behind me, Satan! You are an obstacle in my path, because the way you think is not God's way but man's.'

Then Jesus said to his disciples, 'If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me. For anyone who wants to save his life will lose it; but anyone who loses his life for my sake will find it. What, then, will a man gain if he wins the whole world and ruins his life? Or what has a man to offer in exchange for his life?

'For the Son of Man is going to come in the glory of his Father with his angels, and, when he does, he will reward each one according to his behaviour.'

Second Reading

Having come to a Job-like resolution of the agonising problem of his own people's fate, Paul embarks on an exhortation about the Christian life. Several of his letters follow this pattern of theological debate followed by ethical advice. If obedience to the Law (and the sacrificial cult it sanctioned) is no longer the path to salvation, as he has argued, then what kind of life are believers to lead?

Today's reading offers the answer. Against the defining horizon of God's mercy, they are to lead lives of self-sacrifice. Their "new mind" will show them what accords with God's will and is therefore good and perfect. This guidance will come from within. Paul makes it clear that, while this way of life is not governed by prevailing social norms, it isn't "otherworldly" either. It's that of "living bodies". The baptised are to offer bodily service to others and in the process give true worship to God. This might remind some of Jesus' quote from Hosea: "What I want is mercy, not sacrifice" (Mt 9:13).

Paul's vision of the Christian life is holistic. Body, mind and spirit are at one in the service of God and neighbour. This is the basis for Paul's ensuing exposition on the concrete form of self-sacrificing love. This reading may be short but it sets the scene for the remaining chapters of the letter. It is faith-filled, positive and encouraging, and should be delivered as such.

Gospel

Peter's confession of faith in Jesus as "the Christ, the Son of the living God" leads to a turning point in Matthew's gospel. For the first time ("From that time on . . . " NRSV), Jesus speaks of the suffering, death and resurrection that lie ahead for him. Peter hears nothing of resurrection; he cannot bear to think of Jesus' suffering and dying. Jesus rebukes him in the same categorical way he responded to Satan's temptations in the wilderness. Calling him "an obstacle in my path" brings to mind what Paul says elsewhere about the cross being an obstacle to Jews and madness to pagans (1 Cor 1:23).

To make matters worse, Jesus goes on to insist that disciples of his must follow in his footsteps and actively choose to let go of their lives. This radically undermines the common human enterprise of making something of ourselves. Jesus' call to swim against the cultural tide is echoed, as we have just heard, in Paul's exhorting the Romans not to model their lives "on the behaviour of the world about you".

As the post-resurrection narratives make clear, the risen Lord offers no short-cut or by-pass to the realm of glory. The one and only way is the way of the cross. Believers can take heart that this is "God's way" for them to come into the full possession of life. It's a serious, but not sombre, business. Ministers' proclamation should duly reflect the weight of Jesus' teaching contained in this strong exchange.

Concluding Blessing

May the peace of God, which surpasses all understanding, keep your hearts and minds in the knowledge and love of God, and of his Son, our Lord Jesus Christ. Amen.

And may the blessing of almighty God, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, come down on us and remain with us for ever. **Amen.**

Since first being prepared in 1961 for mission to Papua New Guinea, Catholic participants from all over Australia and New Zealand have been placed in 40 countries, assisting the development of 408 communities globally.

In the face of challenges to global mission such as COVID 19 and growing uncertainty about global security, Palms applied its intercultural expertise domestically to extend opportunities for mission within Australian communities through its new **Neighbours Without Borders** program.

Palms is redoubling its efforts in response to overseas communities' requests to assist develop individual and organisational capacity through skill exchange. New skilled and committed applicants are being thoroughly prepared for their intercultural mission in remote parishes, schools and communities abroad.

I urge that you please publish bulletin notices and forward emails sent to you that promote opportunities for individuals to engage in a Palms Global Mission. I also encourage you to help promote the Neighbours Without Borders program to assist Australian parishes and schools to better embrace diversity and build on gifts to grow stronger communities.

Those considering a mission engagement with Palms can be advised of the following support:

- I. The Archdiocese will support:
 - a. the cost of preparing Palms program participants for mission and a re-entry weekend upon return from a mission placement abroad.
 - b. an indexed gratuity payment of \$2,929 (2023) after each year of mission service.
- 2. Palms negotiations with Catholic schools assures great support and benefits for teachers giving up to two years for this mission. Teachers should talk with Palms about the details.

Through those sent on a Palms mission we are all given the opportunity to reach beyond cultural, class and gender differences, to affirm the dignity of all, while "promoting and implementing the development goals that are supported by our deepest religious and ethical values." (Pope Francis).
