<u>Readings this week:</u> Is 25:6 – 10; Ps 22; Phil 4:12 – 14, 19 – 20; Mt 22:1 - 14.

Gospel Reflection ~ Greg Sunter

Who you ate with in Jesus' time was very important – it reflected your own status. To share table with people who were regarded as 'lesser' by nature of their lifestyle or illness was seen to lessen the status of other participants. Sharing table was as much a political action as it was a social one. This week's gospel is an important one for understanding Jesus' message of an inclusive kingdom. The king invites all the 'right' people to attend his son's wedding banquet but they shame him by refusing his invitation and murdering his messengers. This would have been an extraordinary action in Jesus' time. An invitation to the table of your social superior would not be rejected lightly. To try to save face and regain some honour, the king sends his servants to bring in people off the street – the poorest and least socially acceptable people. The invitation to the people off the street, 'bad and good alike', is a reflection of Jesus' own attitude to sharing table. Jesus ate with those who were regarded as unworthy: tax collectors, prostitutes and sinners. It was one of the harshest criticisms of Jesus made by the Pharisees and Scribes: 'He eats with tax collectors and sinners!' One of Jesus' strongest messages was about the inclusive nature of the kingdom and he lived it day to day. His inclusive table fellowship was a powerful statement about the fact that the kingdom is an invitation to all – rich and poor alike, regardless of status in this world. This parable highlights the invitation to join in the kingdom of God that has been rejected by the Jewish leaders but taken up by the 'lesser' people of society. The wedding banquet is a metaphor for the kingdom of God.

Historical Context: This gospel parable is a reflection of the way in which the message of God has been extended to people through time. The first invitation was extended to the Israelites who initially accepted the message of God but in time lost the focus. Jesus further extended the invitation to the Gentiles, viewed by the Jews as unworthy of such a relationship with God. Finally, within the early Christian communities there were some who, despite belonging to the community, failed to live appropriately and demonstrate their acceptance of the message of God.

Have you thought? – Inclusivity: This gospel parable reflects the inclusive way in which Jesus lived his life. In many ways, Jesus was a scandal in his society because he didn't obey the social boundaries. He was very clear in being inclusive and attentive to those who were normally shunned. Today, those boundaries are just as clear and easily identified but the methods of excluding people have perhaps become a bit more subtle. Who are the 'shunned' and 'left out' in our society today? Where do the boundaries lie? Who would Jesus be reaching out to and seeking to include in today's society?

Gospel Focus – 'How did you get in here?': In light of the inclusive kingdom metaphor in this passage, the final portion of the gospel may be a bit troubling to readers. When a guest is not wearing a wedding garment he is cast out of the banquet. We might say that being invited at the last minute the guest was unable to find suitable clothing. It is a sign that although he has been an unlikely inclusion in the banquet, he has not made any effort to respond to the generosity of the king and take up one of the cloaks that would have been provided and thus give due honour to his host. This is symbolic of those who refuse to change their ways and do not live as followers of Jesus even when they have been included in the kingdom.

Readings and Commentaries

However disappointing it is that the English-speaking Churches have failed to agree in full on the translation of the Lord's Prayer, we still pray with one voice for "our daily bread". This is remarkable, given that no-one knows for sure what the word translated as "daily" really means. The Greek word is too rare for useful comparisons to be made. It could mean "for today" or "for the future" or something like "super-essential". That ambiguity opens up fruitful possibilities.

"For the future" connects the petition with today's first reading. Isaiah's vision of the messianic banquet fires our imagination of what the end-times promise – an inclusive gathering of humankind communing at a table laden with food and wine. Even if we persist in saying "daily bread," we can still let this glorious vision of the culmination of God's rule come to mind.

"For today" fits with the complementary perspective that Paul provides in his address to the Philippians. He's ready, he says, "for anything anywhere: full stomach or empty stomach...". He's learnt to be content with what wealth or poverty the day has in store for him. However much or little there is, he can make do on the "bread for today". That's a freedom that citizens of affluent consumer societies can only pray for.

A reading from the prophet Isaiah

25:6-10

On this mountain, the Lord of hosts will prepare for all peoples a banquet of rich food, a banquet of fine wines, of food rich and juicy, of fine strained wines. On this mountain he will remove the mourning veil covering all peoples, and the shroud enwrapping all nations, he will destroy Death for ever. The Lord will wipe away the tears from every cheek; he will take away his people's shame everywhere on earth, for the Lord has said so. That day, it will be said: See, this is our God in whom we hoped for salvation; the Lord is the one in whom we hoped. We exult and we rejoice that he has saved us; for the hand of the Lord

rests on this mountain.

R. I shall live in the house of the Lord all the days of my life.

The Lord is my shepherd; there is nothing I shall want. Fresh and green are the pastures where he gives me repose. Near restful waters he leads me, to revive my drooping spirit. R.

First Reading

In Isaiah's oracle about the messianic banquet, several boundaries disappear as we listen. The boundary separating Israel from the nations dissolves; this banquet is for "all peoples". Earthly time and heavenly time merge, for this event will occur in God's good time. Grief gives way to joy, limits are swept away by abundance, and alienation from God is replaced with communion. It's a vision of fulfilment beyond human imagining. This passage may be familiar to some because it's a recommended text for funerals, but that use may lead to a common misinterpretation. The "mourning veil" and "shroud" are not garments that clothe either mourners or the dead. They refer to the veil in the Temple that kept the Holy of Holies from view, because for earthly mortals to see God's glory was to die. That barrier is destined to be removed to let human beings commune with the divine. This is a visionary text that draws on powerful images. One is that of a banquet. The enjoyment of abundant fare and table-friendship is a fundamental human good that serves well to symbolise our ultimate destiny. Another is that of the holy mountain. Mountain peaks appear regularly in the scriptures as privileged places for human beings to encounter God. Isaiah combines these images to paint a picture of profound appeal. The oracle has a poetic quality to it, as is evidenced by the way it is set out in the lectionary. Readers who respect this and give the assembly time to dwell happily on the images will be doing a good work.

Responsorial Psalm

The third use of Psalm 22/23 for this year, following its appearance during both Lent and Easter, is clearly justified by the banquet image it has in common with the first reading. This time it is distinguished by the use of a different response, taken from the end rather than the beginning of the psalm. It reinforces the theme of Isaiah's oracle. Much of the earlier commentary on the psalm is repeated here. The overarching image in play is God as Israel's shepherd. The people's familiarity with the responsibilities of earthly shepherds made it easy to think of God in these terms. Just as shepherds ensured their sheep were kept safe and fed, so Israel's God protected and nourished the nation. Complementing the prime image of shepherding is that of hospitality. Generous provision for guests was (and remains) embedded in middle eastern culture. God may thus be readily thought of as a host who welcomes guests with scented oil and plies them with an abundance of food and drink. The buoyant spirit of the psalm is tinged with a realistic recognition of life's difficulties. Shepherds must lead their flock through "the valley of darkness," while hosts provide for their guests "in the sight of (their) foes". The principal challenge for readers is to pray this very familiar and much-loved psalm with fresh devotion. They will have served the assembly well if they give the impression the psalm has only just been discovered. They also need to take care with the two-part response and the two six-line stanzas. Thoughtful intonation and pausing will give the assembly the cues it needs to respond with confidence.

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Philippians 4:12–14, 19–20

I know how to be poor and I know how to be rich too. I have been through my initiation and now I am ready for anything anywhere; full stomach or empty stomach, poverty or plenty. There is nothing I cannot master with the help of the One who gives me strength. All the same, it was good of you to share with me in my hardships. In return my God will fulfil all your needs, in Christ Jesus, as lavishly as only God can. Glory to God, our Father, for ever and ever. Amen.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

Jesus said to the chief priests and elders of the people: 'The kingdom of heaven may be compared to a king who gave a feast for his son's wedding. He sent his servants to call those who had been invited, but they would not come. Next he sent some more servants. "Tell those who have been invited," he said, "that I have my banquet all prepared, my oxen and fattened cattle have been slaughtered, everything is ready. Come to the wedding." But they were not interested: one went off to his farm, another to his business, and the rest seized his servants, maltreated them and killed them. The king was furious. He dispatched his troops, destroyed those murderers and burnt their town. Then he said to his servants, "The wedding is ready; but as those who were invited proved to be unworthy, go to the crossroads in the town and invite everyone you can find to the wedding." So these servants went out on to the roads and collected together everyone they could find, bad and good alike; and the wedding hall was filled with guests. [When the king came in to look at the guests he noticed one man who was not wearing a wedding garment, and said to him, "How did you get in here, my friend, without a wedding garment?" And the man was silent. Then the king said to the attendants, "Bind him hand and foot and throw him out into the dark, where there will be weeping and grinding of teeth." For many are called, but few are chosen.'

Second Reading

Apart from the final words of personal greeting that round off Paul's letter to the Philippians, today's passage brings it to a close. In verses omitted from the lectionary text, Paul acknowledges receipt of several gifts of money the community had sent to support him (4:15-16). Earlier in the letter he had identified "brother Epaphroditus" as the community's courier (2:25).

That's the background to Paul's words: "it was good of you to share with me in my hardships". Paul's regular practice was to insist on being financially independent, refusing, for example, to accept support from the Corinthians (1 Cor 9:12-15) or the Ephesians (Acts 20:33-34). He seems to have made an exception of the Philippians because of his friendship with them. But even while expressing his thanks to them, Paul seems reluctant to admit his needs. He writes of his capacity for self-sufficiency — a Stoic virtue, but here explicitly rooted in God's sure bounty. All this seems to moderate Paul's gratitude for the Philippians' support.

Nonetheless, this is an attractive reading. It offers wise counsel about contentment in our current age of aspiration and entitlement. Above all it invites grateful acknowledgement of God's generous goodness. Readers should be able to convey its strongly affirmative message without difficulty.

Gospel

22:1-14

As he did with the preceding parable of the vineyard and wicked tenants, Matthew has incorporated allegorical features into the story of the wedding feast. The king's extreme actions — murdering those who refused his invitation and burning their town — make more sense in the light of the Romans' ruthless destruction of Jerusalem and the killing of its inhabitants in the year 70 AD.

Several Sundays ago, Jesus told the Syro-Phoenician woman that he had been sent "only to the lost sheep of the House of Israel" (15:25). Today's parable seems to be set within this perspective. The religious authorities of Israel had refused to respond to Jesus, so it's the "lost sheep" who are invited in their place. The lectionary's longer option today includes the disconcerting postscript of the guest without a wedding garment. It's a jarring transition after the positive image of the wedding hall filled with the new guests. This awkwardness may be explained by viewing this appendix as a separate parable aimed at challenging complacency in the Christian community. Membership must not be taken for granted; it demands righteous living.

If Matthew has indeed juxtaposed two parables, there is a case for choosing the shorter text and concentrating on the message of the first parable. Even so, the story of the wedding feast presents the challenge of holding together the conflicting images of a bustling wedding hall and the smoking ruins of a town. It sets the stage for the increasingly tense confrontation between Jesus and the religious authorities that will ultimately climax in his execution.

Concluding Blessing

May almighty God bless us in his kindness and pour out saving wisdom upon us. **Amen.**

May he nourish us always with the teachings of the faith and make us persevere in holy deeds.

For some two years and more we have been walking the pilgrim path together as 'One Mission two Parishes', i.e. St Luke the Evangelist Blackburn South and St Timothy's Forest Hill. Some may even describe it as our contemporary 'Emmaus Walk'.

As you know there is only one of me and many of you. I have been the Parish Priest of SL and ST now for over two years. The PPC has been discussing during this time how best to design our weekend Mass Schedule so that it can be managed by one Priest moving forward; as has been mentioned in the Parish Bulletin/Newsletter from time to time during this period. The Divine Word Missionaries who have been providing regular supplies for us have advised that they will no longer be as available as they have been moving into 2024, for their members are ageing too and there are not as many of them as there used to be.

The proposition:

- There's only one Priest, many Parishioners and two Parishes
- All Parishioners have busy schedules
- Because Parishioners have busy schedules it will be easier to relocate a Mass that's already well attended rather than design a timetable to suit one priest and two parishes
- It has been suggested that while the Divine Word Missionaries are still able to assist that we leave our Saturday evening schedule as it is in both Parishes
- A good number of ST Parishioners have advised that their 9.00am Sunday morning Mass is too early
- That leaves us with Sunday mornings:
 - o at the moment there is only one morning Mass at ST
 - o as we move forward this ought to become the practice at SL
 - o it is proposed that the 8.30am at SL remain
 - o it is proposed that the 10.30am be relocated to ST
 - o this will provide Parishioners there with a later morning Mass
 - o we can consolidate our Rosters
 - o we can consolidate our music resources
 - by relocating this Mass Parishioners from our 'One Mission and Two
 Parishes' can gather at ST which is 9 minutes away from SL via Canterbury
 Road and 11 minutes away via Hawthorn Road
- It is anticipated that this change takes place on the First Sunday of Advent which is 3rd December 2023.
- Feel free to chat with any Combined Parish Pastoral Council Member



Aid to the Church in Need joins call to prayer and fasting for peace in the Holy Land

The pontifical foundation Aid to the Church in Need (ACN) joins the Catholic bishops of the Holy Land in their call for a day of prayer and fasting for peace, to take place next Tuesday, 17 October.

The appeal was voiced by Cardinal Pierbattista Pizzaballa, Latin Patriarch of Jerusalem, in the name of the Catholic bishops of the Holy Land. "Once again, we find ourselves in the midst of a political and military crisis. We have suddenly been catapulted into a sea of unprecedented violence", writes the Patriarch, referring to the full-blown military conflict that erupted between armed Palestinian organisations and the Israeli armed forces, and which has already caused the death of hundreds of civilians.

To beseech God for peace, the Patriarch asks that the Catholics in the Holy Land join in a day of fasting, abstinence, and prayer. The executive president of ACN, Regina Lynch, <u>had already issued a call for prayers for peace</u> in the Holy Land on Monday. Now, in response to the appeal of the bishops of the Holy Land, ACN invites its benefactors and friends to participate in this day of prayer.

ACN Australia & New Zealand has arranged for a vigil of Eucharistic Adoration to take place from 9.00pm Tuesday 17 October until 6.00am Wednesday 18 October in the parish church of Our Lady of the Rosary, St Marys, NSW. All are welcome at any time. During this vigil, the rosary will be prayed at 10.00pm, 12.00am, 2.00am, and 5.00am. The 5.00am Rosary will be in conjunction with the worldwide initiative "One Million Children praying the Rosary" where peace in the Holy Land is one of the intentions of this year's campaign.

Noting that many will not be able to participate in the above event, ACN encourages parishes to alert their people to this call and arrange similar opportunities for eucharistic adoration and the recitation of the rosary so that, in the words of Cardinal Pizzaballa, we may "turn our hearts to God the Father... in prayer and intercession." Where parish gatherings are not possible, families and individuals can commit to undertake their own prayer, fasting and abstinence on Tuesday 17 October, pleading to God the Father for peace.
