

<u>Readings this week:</u> Ex 22:20 – 26; Ps 17; 1 Thess 1:5 – 10; Mt 22:34 - 40. Gospel Reflection ~ Greg Sunter

Like last week's gospel, we again have an example of the Pharisees seeking to 'catch Jesus out' in his interpretation of scripture. The Pharisees were regarded as the great interpreters of the Torah – the Law. To them, ALL the commandments were vitally important, not just the Ten Commandments given to Moses with which we are perhaps most familiar, but the 613 mitzvot (commandments) contained within the Torah – the first five books of the Bible. These 613 mitzvot governed all aspects of Jewish life. For the Pharisees to ask Jesus about the 'greatest' commandment was a blatant challenge to him. Perhaps they expected Jesus to name one commandment and then they could challenge him with a whole series of 'What about ...?' questions. Jesus' answer to the Pharisees highlights their preoccupation with the particulars of the Law contained within scripture. In their over-emphasis on the details of religious observance, they have forgotten about the most basic element of faith: to love the Lord your God with all your heart, soul and mind. Jesus reminds them that being faithful to God isn't about following precise rules but rather it is simply about loving God. With this one sentence, Jesus undermines the power position of the Pharisees. If the Law is as simple as 'Love God', what need is there of Pharisees to interpret the details of the Law? Having pulled the rug out from under them, Jesus follows up with his reminder that the second most important commandment is to love your neighbour as yourself. This is a call to compassion and justice that Jesus practised freely but was sadly lacking in the religious authorities of his time. Scriptural context – Quoting scripture: The question and response that we see in this gospel passage was a common form of scholarly debate in the Jewish tradition. The Pharisees ask Jesus which of the commandments is the greatest. Jesus responds by directly quoting the commandment from the ancient scriptures. His reply, 'You must love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind,' comes directly from Deuteronomy 6:4. Further, Jesus' follow-up, 'you must love your neighbour as yourself,' comes from Leviticus 19:18. Deuteronomy and Leviticus are two of the first five books of the Bible that make up the Jewish Torah, or Law. Living the Gospel -**Compassion:** Jesus' words call us to love our neighbour as ourselves. We are called to treat others as we would like to be treated ourselves. To be able to do this, we need to picture ourselves in their place – experiencing all that they are experiencing; not imposing our own values and circumstances. To see ourselves in the place of another is the key to responding with compassion. The origin of the word 'compassion' means experiencing with. If we are able to truly 'experience with' another person perhaps then we can genuinely recognise and respond to their needs. Gospel Focus - Love your neighbour as yourself: There is an implicit, or understood, commandment within the command to love your neighbour as yourself. That is, we must first love ourselves. Whilst to say someone 'loves themself' is used as a criticism of a person who is a bit too vain, that is not what is intended here. If we are to love others as we love ourselves we must first be content and happy with who we are. It is only when we are comfortable with who we are that we are able to reach out to those around us with compassion.



Collect

Readings and Commentaries

In his thoroughly-researched study of the apostle Paul (Paul: A Biography, NY: HarperCollins, 2018, 110-112), scripture scholar N. T. Wright observes that in the ancient world to serve the living God was to abandon "the great pantheon of Greek and Roman gods". And the "most obviously powerful divinity to be given up was Caesar".

He suggests that Paul deliberately chose to journey to "key centres of Roman rule and Roman cult in the eastern Mediterranean," such as "Ephesus, Philippi and Corinth". "I suspect," he writes, "that Paul was deliberately finding ways to make the point: there is one 'Lord,' one Kyrios, and it isn't Caesar. The communities of those loyal to Jesus ... were marked by a confession of that loyalty that was extremely simple and extremely profound: Kyrios lesous Christos, 'Jesus Messiah is Lord'".

Jesus' reply to his adversaries was also simple and profound: "Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar – and to God what belongs to God". After all this time, it still poses the uncomfortable question as to which gods we serve.

A reading from the prophet Isaiah 45:1, 4–6

Thus says the Lord to his anointed, to Cyrus, whom he has taken by his right hand to subdue nations before him and strip the loins of kings, to force gateways before him that their gates be closed no more:

It is for the sake of my servant Jacob, of Israel my chosen one, that I have called you by your name, conferring a title though you do not know me. I am the Lord, unrivalled; there is no other God besides me. Though you do not know me, I arm you

that men may know

from the rising to the setting of the sun that, apart from me, all is nothing.

First Reading

The benign view of other nations that emerges in the latter parts of Isaiah reaches a high point in today's reading. The Persian emperor Cyrus is addressed as God's anointed, meaning messiah. Normally only conferred on Israel's own kings, this high title is bestowed on Cyrus as God's agent on Israel's behalf. With divine assistance he conquers Babylon and allows the exiles to return to their homeland and rebuild Jerusalem and the temple, though none of this is mentioned in the reading.

The whole point, as Isaiah makes clear, is not to exalt Cyrus as such. It's to show Cyrus and all people that the God of Israel is the supreme Lord of all. For all his success in establishing and extending the Persian empire, Cyrus is the servant of God's masterplan of salvation. Isaiah's pronouncement testifies to God's sovereign freedom in bringing this plan to fulfilment.

The reading will be obscure for those who are unfamiliar with biblical history and Isaiah's prophetic mission, but at least readers can proclaim the text with clarity. The lengthy introductory verse addresses Cyrus in honorific terms for his military achievements (all with God's help). This sets the scene for the prophetic word to be spoken that explains the divine purpose lying behind Cyrus' success. Readers will have done good work if the assembly takes God's claims to heart: "I am the Lord, unrivalled... apart from me, all is nothing".

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 95:1, 3-5, 7-10

R. Give the Lord glory and honour.

O sing a new song to the Lord, sing to the Lord all the earth. Tell among the nations his glory and his wonders among all the peoples. **R**.

The Lord is great and worthy of praise, to be feared above all gods; the gods of the heathens are naught. It was the Lord who made the heavens. **R**.

Give the Lord, you families of peoples, give the Lord glory and power, give the Lord the glory of his name. Bring an offering and enter his courts. R.

Worship the Lord in his temple, O earth, tremble before him. Proclaim to the nations: 'God is king,' He will judge the peoples in fairness. **R**.

Responsorial Psalm

Isaiah's insistence on the unqualified supremacy of Israel's God is taken up and repeated in the responsorial psalm. Psalm 95/96 is a compilation of texts from other places in the Old Testament woven together in a hymn of praise. The psalmist calls on all people and the whole of creation to acclaim God as creator, king and judge. This summons is conveyed immediately by the imperative response: "Give the Lord glory and honour".

The verses insist repeatedly on this duty to praise God. All people are enjoined to "sing a new song," to "bring an offering," and to "worship the Lord in his temple". In the typical style of Hebrew poetry, the phrases echo one another with variations on this singular theme. In effect, the psalm is both a call to prayer and a confession of faith in the one true God.

The tone of the psalm is strong, wholly affirmative and faith-filled. Readers will do well if they draw the assembly into its enthusiastic spirit.

A reading from the first letter of St Paul to the Thessalonians 1:1–5

From Paul, Silvanus and Timothy, to the Church in Thessalonika which is in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ; wishing you grace and peace from God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ.

We always mention you in our prayers and thank God for you all, and constantly remember before God our Father how you have shown your faith in action, worked for love and persevered through hope, in our Lord Jesus Christ.

We know, brothers, that God loves you and that you have been chosen, because when we brought the Good News to you, it came to you not only as words, but as power and as the Holy Spirit and as utter conviction.

A reading from the holy Gospel according to Matthew

22:15-21

The Pharisees went away to work out between them how to trap Jesus in what he said. And they sent their disciples to him, together with the Herodians, to say, 'Master, we know that you are an honest man and teach the way of God in an honest way, and that you are not afraid of anyone, because a man's rank means nothing to you. Tell us your opinion then. Is it permissible to pay taxes to Caesar or not?' But Jesus was aware of their malice and replied, 'You hypocrites! Why do you set this trap for me? Let me see the money you pay the tax with.' They handed him a denarius, and he replied, 'Whose head is this? Whose name?' 'Caesar's,' they replied. He then said to them, 'Very well, give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar - and to God what belongs to God.'

Second Reading

In the course of the final few Sundays of the Church's year, the gospel reading will testify to the increasingly tense conflict between Jesus and the religious authorities. Before this reaches its climax in Jesus' betrayal and crucifixion, he is prompted to speak in apocalyptic terms of the turmoil of the end times. Fittingly, the end times loom large in the letter we read during these same weeks, Paul's first to the Thessalonians, perhaps the oldest writing of the New Testament. A key issue he addresses is the Thessalonians' anxiety and confusion about Christ's return in glory.

This is not at all evident from the affectionate and encouraging words with which the letter begins. In the customary style of letters in the ancient world, Paul and his co-workers commence with greetings to the community, a prayer of thanksgiving and words of affirmation. The lectionary doesn't always include the initial words of Paul's letters, so it's refreshing to see a good model of them here.

The Thessalonians are commended for their active faith, love and hope, these three virtues being mentioned together here for the first time. Paul also applauds the community's response to his proclamation of the good news. They haven't simply listened to mere words, but have allowed his message to have a dramatic effect in their lives. They have laid themselves open to the power of the Holy Spirit and become true believers.

This is a wonderfully positive text for readers to proclaim. It is filled with Paul's faith, enthusiasm and affection, and naturally lends itself to be delivered in that spirit.

Gospel

Only once in the gospels is Jesus bettered in argument. The honour for that achievement goes to an unnamed Syro-Phoenician (or Canaanite) woman, as we heard several Sundays ago (Mt 15:21-28). In contrast to her feisty fearlessness, the antagonists in today's verbal sparring are obsequious. They insincerely praise Jesus while plotting against him with malice in their hearts.

The dilemma by means of which they seek to trap Jesus is crystal clear. Either Jesus declares the Roman tax contrary to the Law of Moses, and thus falls foul of the Roman regime, or he affirms its legitimacy and loses the support of the people. Jesus neatly sidesteps the trap, though in the process implicitly approving the tax.

The sting in the tail is his reminder of what lay at the heart of Israel's faith, God's claim to their unfettered allegiance: "You shall love the Lord your God with all your heart, with all your soul, with all your strength" (Dt 6:5). His reply is all the more powerful in view of the choice with which he himself will soon be faced – whether to drink the cup of suffering and death or not. There is much more going on here than verbal jousting and clever one-upmanship. Strangely, the lectionary text omits the verse that records the outcome of the exchange: "This reply took them by surprise, and they left him alone and went away".

Concluding Blessing

May the God of all consolation order our days in his peace and grant us the gifts of his blessing. Amen.

May he free us always from every distress and confirm our hearts in his love. Amen.

So that on this life's journey we may be effective in good works, rich in the gifts of hope, faith and charity, and may come happily to eternal life. **Amen.**

And may the blessing of almighty God, the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit, come down on us and remain with us for ever. Amen.
