Eleventh Sunday in Ordinary Time

Year A - 14th June 2026



Exodus 19:2-6, Psalm 99(100):2-3,5, Romans 5:6-11.
GOSPEL READING: Matthew 9:36-10:8

Meditation: Do you believe in the life-changing power of the Gospel and experience its transforming effect in your life? The core of the Gospel message is quite simple: the kingdom (or reign) of God is very near! What is the kingdom of God? It is that society of men and women who know God's love and mercy, and who willingly obey and honour God as their Lord and King. In the prayer which Jesus gave to his disciples (the Lord's Prayer or Our Father), he taught them to pray for God to reign in their daily lives and in the world around them: May your kingdom come and your will be done on earth as it is in heaven.



The power of the Gospel to heal and set free: When Jesus proclaimed the good news of God's kingdom he also demonstrated the power of the Gospel with supernatural signs and wonders. Jesus healed people who suffered physical, emotional, and mental illnesses. He freed people from spiritual bondage to sin and demonic powers. Jesus gave his disciples the same authority he had to heal and set people free from spiritual bondage. The Gospel (which literally means "good news") which Jesus proclaimed is just as relevant and real today, the kingdom of heaven is at hand. If we believe in the Lord Jesus, the Word of God made flesh, and in the power of the Gospel, we will know and experience the freedom, joy, and power he gives us that enables us to live and witness as his disciples. No one can buy heaven; but if we know the love and mercy of Jesus Christ, then we already possess heaven in our hearts! Do you believe that Jesus can change and transform your life and share with you the power and authority of God's kingdom?

Jesus chose ordinary people to do extraordinary work: Jesus commissioned his disciples to carry on the works which he did - to speak God's word and to bring his healing power to the weary and oppressed. In the choice of the twelve apostles we see a characteristic feature of God's work – Jesus chose very ordinary people. They were non-professionals, had no wealth or privileged position. They were chosen from the common people who did ordinary things, had no special education, and no social advantages. Jesus wanted ordinary people who could take an assignment and do it extraordinarily well. He chose these men, not for what they were, but for what they would be capable of becoming under his direction and power. When the Lord calls us to serve, we must not think we have nothing or very little to offer. The Lord takes what ordinary people, like us, can offer and uses it for greatness in his kingdom. Do you believe that God wants to work in and through you for his glory?

Jesus empowers his disciples to act in his name, by John Chrysostom (347-407AD).

"If the Spirit had not yet been given, since Jesus had not yet been glorified, how then did the disciples cast out the unclean spirits? They did this by his own command, by the Son's authority. Note the careful timing of their mission. They were not sent out at the beginning of their walk with him. They were not sent out until they had sufficiently benefited by following him daily. It was only after they had seen the dead raised, the sea rebuked, devils expelled, the legs of a paralytic brought to life, sins remitted, lepers cleansed, and had received a sufficient proof of his power both by deeds and words -only then did he send them out. And he did not send them out unprepared to do dangerous deeds, for as yet there was no danger in Palestine. They had only to stand against verbal abuse. However, Jesus still warned them of larger perils to come, preparing them for what was future."

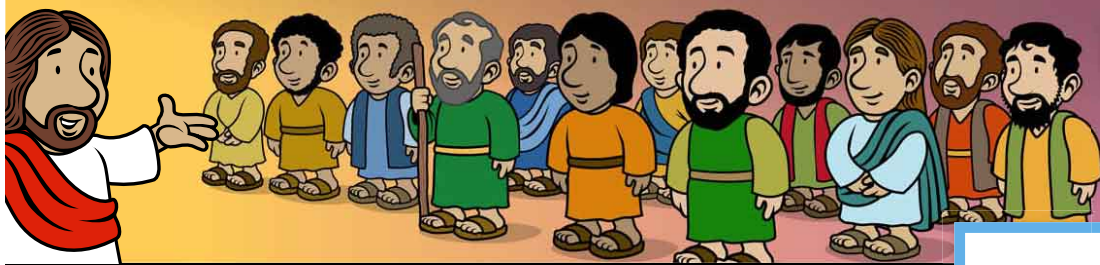

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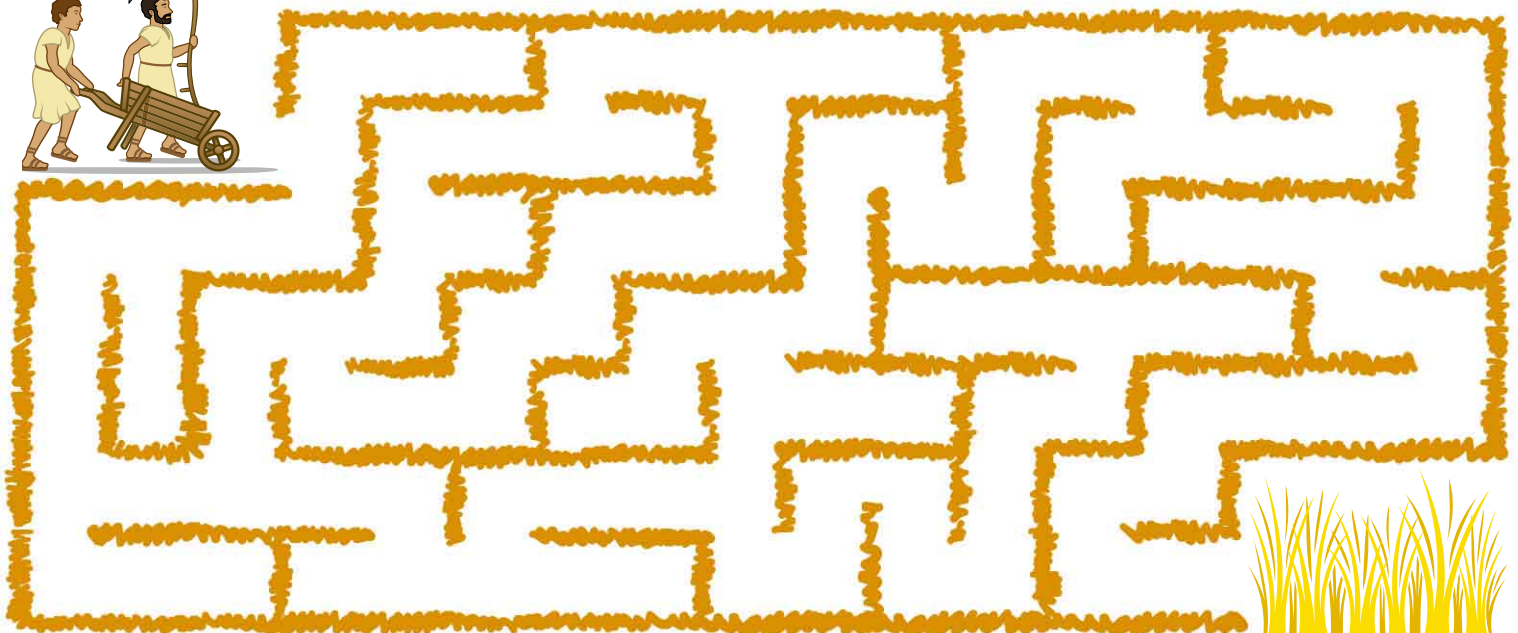

READINGS AND REFLECTIONS

Over recent decades, we have come to understand more fully that, by our baptism, we not only become part of the Church but we are called to share in the Church's mission. We are not so much helping the priest in his ministry; rather priest and people together are participating in the mission of Christ because we have all been baptised into the Body of Christ. We are all 'missionary disciples'.

In the gospel, Jesus sends the apostles out on mission. It is his mission from the Father that they are to continue, namely, to proclaim that the kingdom of God is close at hand. Jesus brought about God's kingdom by pushing back the boundaries of evil, and promoting justice, healing and wholeness. This is the vocation of all the baptised.

A reading from the book of Exodus

19:2-6

From Rephidim the Israelites set out again; and when they reached the wilderness of Sinai, there in the wilderness they pitched their camp; there facing the mountain Israel pitched camp.

Moses then went up to God, and the Lord called to him from the mountain, saying, 'Say this to the House of Jacob, declare this to the sons of Israel, "You yourselves have seen what I did with the Egyptians, how I carried you on eagle's wings and brought you to myself. From this you know that now, if you obey my voice and hold fast to my covenant, you of all the nations shall be my very own, for all the earth is mine. I will count you a kingdom of priests, a consecrated nation."

Responsorial Psalm

Ps 99:2-3, 5

R. We are his people: the sheep of his flock.

Cry out with joy to the Lord, all the earth. Serve the Lord with gladness. Come before him, singing for joy. **R.**

Know that he, the Lord, is God. He made us, we belong to him, we are his people, the sheep of his flock. **R.**

Indeed, how good is the Lord, eternal his merciful love. He is faithful from age to age. **R.**

A reading from the letter of St Paul to the Romans

5:6-11

We were still helpless when at his appointed moment Christ died for sinful men. It is not easy to die even for a good man - though of course for someone really worthy, a man might be prepared to die - but what proves that God loves us is that Christ died for us while we were still sinners. Having died to make us righteous, is it likely that he would now fail to save us from God's anger? When we were reconciled to God by the death of his Son, we were still enemies; now that we have been reconciled surely we may count on being saved by the life of his Son? Not merely because we have been reconciled but because we are filled with joyful trust in God through our Lord Jesus Christ, through whom we have already gained our reconciliation.

First Reading

Moses and the people are gathered at the holy place of Mount Sinai where God established the covenant with them. The people are called to recognise and accept God's protection and to live accordingly as a consecrated nation. The image of a 'kingdom of priests' expresses this relationship strongly if somewhat ambiguously. Under the new covenant in Christ, St Peter applied this promise to the Christian community (1 Pet 2:9) and, 2000 years later, Vatican Council II developed the idea of the baptismal priesthood, common to all the faithful (LG 10). This is the basis for our sharing in the mission of Christ. The phrase '*I have carried you on eagle's wings*' is a familiar and reassuring line from church music. In proclaiming this text, the reader should warmly assure the assembly of God's love and care.

Responsorial Psalm

Psalm 99/100 is a joyous acclamation of trust in God's care for us. God made us; we belong to God. This harmonises beautifully with the theme of God's providence affirmed in the first reading.

It also introduces the image of the shepherd and the flock. This will reappear at the beginning of the gospel when Jesus sees the people '*harassed and dejected like sheep without a shepherd*' and his heart goes out to them.

It will be a delight for the cantor/reader to sing of God's faithful and merciful love. The three-line verses are unusual, however, so care needs to be taken with the intonation so that the response of the people is clearly cued.

Second Reading

Parts of this reading can mislead: when we sin, God is not angry with us; God is not our enemy. Rather Paul is saying that God loves us even while we are sinning! We may be estranged by sin but we have already been reconciled by Christ. So even while we are sinners, God is loving us, Christ is dying for us, we are being reconciled. God is always reaching out with mercy to save us. This is the source of our joyful trust in God. Reconciliation is God's work, not ours. It is important that this message is clearly communicated by the reader. As well as being inclusive, the NRSV translation at the end of the book is easier to understand and read aloud.



**A reading from the holy Gospel
according to Matthew**

9:36-10:8

When Jesus saw the crowds he felt sorry for them because they were harassed and dejected, like sheep without a shepherd. Then he said to his disciples, 'The harvest is rich but the labourers are few, so ask the Lord of the harvest to send labourers to his harvest.'

He summoned his twelve disciples, and gave them authority over unclean spirits with power to cast them out and to cure all kinds of diseases and sickness.

These are the names of the twelve apostles: first, Simon who is called Peter, and his brother Andrew; James the son of Zebedee, and his brother John; Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas, and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus, and Thaddaeus; Simon the Zealot and Judas Iscariot, the one who was to betray him. These twelve Jesus sent out, instructing them as follows:

'Do not turn your steps to pagan territory, and do not enter any Samaritan town; go rather to the lost sheep of the House of Israel. And as you go, proclaim that the kingdom of heaven is close at hand. Cure the sick, raise the dead, cleanse the lepers, cast out devils. You received without charge, give without charge.'

Gospel

The reading opens with a beautiful and moving image. The people are harassed and dejected, lost like sheep without a shepherd. Jesus' heart goes out to them. He seems to recognise that this is more than he can handle on his own. So he enlists the disciples to help expand the reach of his ministry.

He blesses them with a ministry of power over evil, a ministry of healing that proclaims the closeness of God's kingdom. With an initial focus on their own Jewish community, they are to share in the God-given mission of Christ himself.

The naming of the twelve is like an aside within the story of their commissioning but serves to identify 'the twelve' as a special group within the broader group of disciples. This unique use of the name 'apostles' in Matthew's gospel highlights their being sent on mission.

This idea of 'missionary disciples' has shaped our understanding of the contemporary Church and of the meaning of our baptism.

CONCLUDING PRAYER

Solemn Blessing (Ordinary Time II)

May the peace of God,
which surpasses all understanding,
keep our hearts and minds
in the knowledge and love of God,
and of his Son, our Lord Jesus Christ.

Amen.

And may the blessing of almighty God,
the Father, and the Son, and the Holy Spirit,
come down on us and remain with us for ever.
